Please...We must do what we can, NOW. First, we must support the Audubon Society's proposed Tree Code Reforms. And,

1. As a temporary stop-gap measure until Title 11 reforms can be developed and adopted, I specifically urge the City Council to:

a. Require inch-for-inch mitigation for cutting large, healthy, nondangerous and non-nuisance trees $\geq 30''$ diameter at breast height "dbh" in development and non-development situations until Title 11 preservation standards can be reformed.

b. Require posting and a 30-day delay before any tree \geq 30" dbh is permitted to be cut.
